Families can go for the King Lounge that sleeps four with a king size bed and twin beds separated off by curtains. The other rooms all give onto patios with or without a chiminea. Commune Design's boho chic interior gives pride of place to natural materials, artisanal textiles, mid-century modern furniture and a palette informed by the colours of the desert.

As for food, the King's Highway restaurant plays the roadside diner card in a nod to the years when the premises were home to a typical American motel and they serve all the classic American dishes (Caesar salad, grilled chicken sandwich, mac & cheese). As the soundproofing in the rooms isn't always that good, it's better to ask for a room away from the two pools—just in case there's some wild party going down. Just pop on a vinyl on your room's record player, sit back and relax.




Nine Orchard

One area of New York to keep your eye on is Dimes Square, a little pocket on the Lower East Side bordering on Chinatown—and it is here that Nine Orchard opened its doors last year. This little gem of a hotel is located in a Beaux-Arts building dating back to 1912, which was originally home to the Jarmulowsky Bank. Each of the 116 rooms spread over 13 floors features moulded ceilings, immense windows that let the natural light flood in and built-in speakers. Incidentally, the com-

fortable, chic and minimalist rooms are all numbered like New York apartments: a word to the wise, 5K offers views of the Chrysler Building and the Empire State Building.

Last but not least, the menus at the Corner Bar, the Swan Room (a cocktail bar situated under the lobby's incredibly high domed ceiling) and the Amado Grill all feature dishes by New York super chef Ignacio Mattos (Estela, Lodi etc), who used to live locally. Top that!



Little Cat Lodge

Located in a small ski resort in Upstate New York, the Little Cat Lodge is the new name of a hundred-year old inn that has been renovated by the architects from Love Is Enough. It now has a mountain chalet vibe that even extends to the restaurant, which serves Alpine-inspired dishes. The former inn was bought by the famous New York restaurateur duo Matt Kriegman and Noah Bernamoff with the (excellent) idea of creating a cosy, wood-panelled getaway full of bespoke wooden furniture, vintage lounge chairs and plaids to snuggle up in. There's plenty to do here from skiing in the winter to hiking in the summer and the sauna all year round and, when the weather's warm, you can enjoy a dip in the pool, while admiring the views of Catamount Mountain. Staying here is undoubtedly a very stylish way of answering the call of the wild!



The James Bradley

Feeling nostalgic about his childhood holidays in Jersey Shore—and as the ideal place to stay didn't seem to exist—New York-based property developer George DiStefano decided to have his very own hotel. Travelling back and forth from New York, he finally found a small family-run bed and breakfast for sale less than 100 metres from Bradley Beach. The building dating back to the Victorian period required major renovation work, so DiStefano enlisted friend and interior designer Sebastian Zuchowicki. The result is a real gem of a hotel: The James Bradley.

Each of the 17 rooms are different and decorated in a classical style reminiscent of Italian homes in the Fifties. The two men sourced vintage furniture and objects from eBay, Etsy and flea markets as far away as France and also acquired abstract paintings to exhibit. They had some decorative elements made locally, one example being the sublimely simple wooden bedside tables and the stoneware lamps on them that have more of a design feel. Some of the items are for sale, so don't hesitate to ask if anything takes your fancy. The neutral-hued bed linen is also local as it is made by seamstresses in nearby Asbury Park. And the same goes for the snacks you can order from your room.

There's an almost obsessive attention to detail throughout and The James Bradley is somewhat out of place on this part of the coast that is better known for having been the setting of a very popular, eponymous, reality TV show. However, New Yorkers who have already been won over by the hotel don't hesitate to head south and enjoy this new weekend destination. What about you?

terials to create a calm and soothing atmosphere. The superb kitchen in the large house at the heart of the property looks more like an alchemist's laboratory and, should you be feeling peckish, there are always fruit and pastries on the dining room table. Outside on the veranda, a rattan sofa and chairs look out to sea and fabric lampshades dance in the breeze.

Instructors come from all over the world for the 6-day yoga retreats, each with a different approach and vision. For example, former contemporary dancer and friend of Yoni, Hagar Shachal, works with the healing power of movement. Yoga besides, Kea Retreat is a convivial place where, like in a Greek tavern, it isn't rare to get up and dance after dinner! "Kea Retreat is the fruit of the marriage between Buddha and Zorba the Greek, a place that provides the body and mind with nourishment and where time seems to stand still as you away your days swimming, doing yoga and eating delicious meals", says Yoni.

Yoni's younger brother Uri, who has worked in several leading Michelin-starred restaurants, delights guests with dishes whose recipes he guards jealously, such as a mi-cuit, olive branch grilled grouper, served with a pepper plant leaf, green garlic oil and caper velouté. "The soba noodles and Valonia oak acorns served with a courgette leaf, garum and mint flower broth is a dish I am particularly fond of, because it tells the story of Kea", he says.

Valonia oaks grow all over the island. In times gone by, their acorn cups were used for tanning leather and the acorns themselves ensured the islanders avoided famine. Marcie Mayer, a Californian who lives on Kea, has been trying to convince the locals of this tree's exceptional potential. She makes flour from its acorns and bakes delicious cookies that you can buy from Aristaos, a store selling the very best local products. Ioulida—the island's capital with its narrow winding streets and red roofed houses that rise like an amphitheatre around the main square—is just a few kilometres away. It was once home to the famous painter Alekos Fassianos and you can still find traces of his work there.

The best way to explore Kea is on foot. If you head south, you'll find a path along a valley that leads to the poetic remains of the ancient city of Karthaia. Greek summers are truly something wonderful, full of secret beaches and any number of marvels to discover!

Family-owned Kea Retreat is hidden away on verdant Kea, a little-known Cycladic island not far from Athens. This paradisical yoga retreat set down next to a remote Mediterranean beach is still a well-kept secret, but it's the perfect place to experience the magic of a Greek summer and switch off, while being pampered by Yoni and Uri Eshet.

The rising sun warms the bushes of thyme whose intoxicating perfume floats in the summer air, while the gentle lapping of the waves drifts through the bedroom's half-open shutters conjuring up visions of a refreshing dip in the waters. Kea Retreat is a whole world of wellness by the sea that was created by

Le soleil se lève et réchauffe les buissons de thym dont le parfum enivre l'été. Le clapotis des vagues arrive jusqu'à la chambre aux volets entrouverts et appelle à la baignade. Les pieds dans l'eau, Kea Retreat est une bulle de bien-être créée par Enat et Zviki Eshet, et leurs enfants Yoni et Uri. Ils ont découvert l'île en famille il y a plus de vingt ans. "Nous étions logés chez le pope Lefteris, dont le monastère perché sur un piton rocheux surplombe l'immensité de la mer. Sa femme et lui nous ont accueillis les bras ouverts avec une paire de draps et deux rouleaux de papier toilette! La chambre était simple et la vue grandiose, c'est l'une des plus belles nuits que nous ayons passées sur l'île, et la genèse de notre projet", nous confie Yoni. Il y a quelques années, les Eshet ont patiemment racheté la quinzaine de parcelles qui composent le vallon et la plage de Psathi pour créer un lieu unique, à mi-chemin entre boutique-hôtel et centre de yoga.

Posées sur le sable, nichées dans un potager ou encore perchées sur une colline dans une maison de berger centenaire, les 7 suites de Kea Retreat accueillent les yoginis esthètes en quête de déconnexion. Dans un esprit bohème, elles arborent des tons neutres qui, mêlés aux matériaux naturels, donnent aux intérieurs une ambiance apaisante. Dans la grande maison, qui est le cœur de la propriété, la superbe cuisine ressemble au terrain de jeu d'un alchimiste, tandis que l'immense table de salle à manger est garnie de fruits et douceurs à disposition tout au long de la journée. Dehors, un salon d'été en rotin fait face à la mer, avec ses coussins tressés et ses suspensions en tissu qui ondulent au gré du vent.

Les retraites de yoga durent 6 jours et sont animées par des professeures venues des quatre coins du monde. Chacune a une approche et une pratique différentes du yoga, telle Hagar

Shachal, ancienne danseuse contemporaine et amie de Yoni, qui travaille avec le mouvement et son pouvoir soignant. Au-delà du yoga, Kea Retreat est un lieu convivial où, comme dans les tavernes grecques, il n'est pas rare de danser après le repas! "Kea Retreat est le fruit de la rencontre entre Bouddha et Zorba, un lieu qui nourrit le corps et l'esprit et où le temps s'écoule doucement entre baignade, yoga et délicieux repas", résume Yoni. Son petit frère Uri, passé par les cuisines de grandes tables étoilées, régale les convives. Sa cuisine solaire est faite de produits locaux et de préparations dont il a le secret, tel le mérou mi-cuit grillé au bois d'olivier servi avec un velouté de feuilles de poivrier à l'huile d'ail vert et aux câpres. "Les soba aux glands de chêne vélani, servis dans un bouillon de feuilles de courgette, de garum et de fleurs de menthe, sont un plat que j'affectionne car il raconte l'histoire de Kéa."

Ces arbres trapus qui couvrent l'île d'un manteau vert étaient utilisés il y a longtemps pour le tannage des cuirs les plus fins. Pendant la guerre, leurs glands ont permis aux habitants d'éviter la famine. Marcie Mayer, une Californienne installée sur l'île, tente de convaincre les locaux du potentiel exceptionnel de cet arbre. Avec ses glands, elle produit de la farine et cuisine de délicieux cookies en vente chez Aristaios, une boutique qui propose les meilleurs produits de l'île. À quelques kilomètres, se trouve Ioulida, la capitale construite en amphithéâtre avec ses ruelles tortueuses et ses toits rouges. Le peintre Alekos Fassianos, qui était installé dans le bas du village, a laissé des traces de son œuvre un peu partout. Ici une fresque, là une enseigne... Kéa est une île qui s'explore à pied. Plus au sud, un sentier chemine à flanc de vallon jusqu'aux ruines poétiques de la cité antique de Karthaia. De plage secrète en plage déserte, l'été grec se dévoile et laisse entrevoir quelques-unes de ses merveilles. ●
